SIGNS OF NEW LIFE



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Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

As we prepare for our next Church Huddle on Saturday, June 1, I want to share more information about the resource we'll be using to guide part of our time that day. It is a book called "Twelve Keys to an Effective Church: Strong, Healthy Congregations Living in the Grace of God" by Kennon Callahan. Callahan is a researcher, author, professor, and pastor who has worked with thousands of churches as a consultant. He has developed a highly practical planning model that has assisted many churches in thinking strategically about their mission and ministry.

The essence of the Callahan approach is the actual twelve keys or characteristics of thriving churches, which are listed below:

Relational Characteristics – the sources of satisfaction in congregations:

- Specific, concrete missional objectives
- Pastoral care and outreach
- Corporate, dynamic worship
- Significant relational groups
- Strong leadership resources
- Solid, participatory decision making

Functional Characteristics – if these are not in place, are the source of dissatisfaction in churches:

- Several competent programs and activities
- Open accessibility
- High visibility
- Adequate parking, land, and landscaping
- Adequate space and facilities
- Solid financial resources

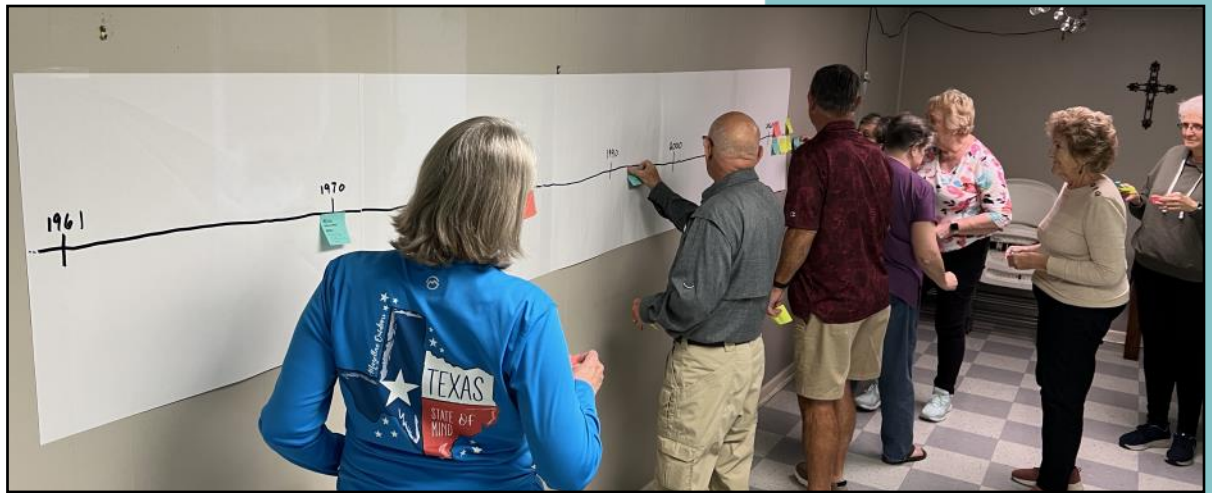


As one can see, this method assumes an established church seeking to increase its effectiveness. At the Huddle we will use Callahan's assessment tool to form the initial steps of a master long-range plan. He suggests a helpful rhythm that has given renewed life to thousands of congregations: claiming current strengths, expanding some, and then adding others.

Callahan's model is well-rounded. It offers evaluation of both relationship-based ministry (pastoral care, worship, groups, etc.) as well as practical necessities for churches (governance, accessibility, parking, and finances). We will spend our time rating how New Life is doing on each of these twelve characteristics. The outcome will be having a sense of what our strengths are that we can expand and add to and what some of our weaknesses are that we can improve. These areas will become the foundation of a strategic planning process.

Our strategic plan will be developed in the months that follow and it will include specific objectives that we want to achieve in the years ahead. But in order to develop these objectives, we have to stop and consider where God is leading us.

That means reflecting on the questions connected to these twelve keys for effectiveness: How is our church enhancing relationships between people? How are people being offered pastoral care? What is the nature of our



worship life centered on word and sacrament? How are leaders raised up among us? How does our governance support the ministry? What kind of programs and activities are we offering to our community and how effective are they? How openly accessible is our property to the community? How visible is our church facility? What kind of impression does our parking and landscaping make? Is there enough room for the activities we host or want to host? What is the state of our financial resources? How are we serving our neighborhood with the love of Jesus?

The plan is to address these questions at the next Church Huddle. Once we come to some consensus on the answers to these questions, then we will have some direction that our objectives are headed toward. And with the objectives determined, we can form a group to draft the overall plan to achieve them.

I hope you'll come to the next Church Huddle on Saturday, June 1 at 10:00 AM. If you're invested in the future of New Life you won't want to miss it! We will begin to think about this strategic planning process and where it might take us.

Our next Orange Street cleanup is September 21. In the church narthex is an adopt-a-spot sign up sheet. This is not a request for you to promise to be a regular, although that would be nice. It will be a list of people who wish to be personally reminded in case you would be able to participate. Ideally, we would have 8 people each time and contrary to current belief you do not have to be over 70 to participate. We pick up litter 4 times a year, never in the summer. See me about a bribe. Do I sound desperate? I am. **HELP**, please.

Lately, I've noticed the fall webworm has taken up residence in a few of my trees, a red bud, pear, and small pecan seedlings (nutlings that I'm digging up anyway). I haven't seen this offspring of a small white moth with black dots on its wings for many years or even decades. I thought the paper wasps were keeping them in check, but I haven't seen any paper wasps this year. Could the early spraying for mosquitoes have done them in? The wasps like to feed the larvae (caterpillars) to their larvae newly hatched in their paper cells. The webworm really is not harmful. The yellowish, hairy, larvae with pairs of black dots down its spine is quite voracious and devours the leaves within the web. A large infestation may cause stress for the tree. The hairs on the larvae may cause skin irritation. There are two to four generations a season and the last one is usually the most damaging. The larvae find a safe place to pupate in leaf litter or cracks on rough bark and winter over. They hatch in the spring, mate and the female lays eggs on leaves to begin the cycle again. It's another cycle, one of an unimaginable number of cycles and part of unimaginable kinds of cycles all interreacting, coexisting, and influencing, one another. How amazing is this creation that we are all a part of.

What is a Memorial?

A memorial is a special monetary gift given in memory of a loved one or the loved one of a friend. Memorials are given instead of flowers at the time of death. They are a wonderful way to give a useful and lasting remembrance at the time of death.

At New Life, we have a tradition of giving memorials after the death of a member or the loved ones of fellow members. The gifts go into a “Memorial Fund” which is used for special needs at the church such as starting a legacy giving fund, or the gifts may be designated for a certain ministry.

A notice of the gift is sent to the family of the deceased by the church office. A record of the gift is included on the donor’s quarterly financial statement if the donor is a member of New Life. Finally, the memorials and other special gifts contributed in memory of someone, or in honor of a person, or a special occasion, are recognized periodically in our Signs of New Life newsletter.

Listen, God is Calling

Synod Assembly Report by Nancy Bryars

That was the theme of this year's Gulf Coast Synod Assembly held at Lord of Life Lutheran Church in the Woodlands. Cheryl Robinson, Pastor Clayton and I attended. It was a time worshipping, learning, meeting new people, eating, and hearing stories of Lutherans listening when God called. There was also the "fun" stuff of hearing reports, approving the budget, elections. (Voting was done electronically using our phones or laptops, and for at least one person that is technically slow, interesting at times.) I especially enjoyed the opening worship service with new songs, and a service of the Word, Healing, and Prayer. Two stories of acting on God's call touched me and I want to share just a bit about them.

Free Wheels:

"The mission of Freewheels Houston is to provide safe, reliable bicycles to refugees, veterans emerging from homelessness and young people from low-income families. Freewheels bicycles provide everyday transportation that enables people from underserved communities to get to work and school and stay healthy and connected."

Free Wheels Houston started in 2015 by volunteers of Christ the King Lutheran Church. In 2022, 162 people volunteered repairing and distributing bikes. Last year over 300 bikes were donated, repaired, and given away. They partnership with individuals, faith communities, foundations, bike shops, corporations, and organizations working with refugees and homeless veterans. Volunteers do not need to be bike riders or skilled bicycle mechanics- just a desire to help those less fortunate that are trying to better their lives.

This touched me because I have never had to worry about transportation to get to work. I have had some sort of bicycle for more than 60 years and it's just been for my pleasure. Giving a used bike or helping to repair seems like such a small effort compared to the difference it can make in one's life.

TREE 4 HOPE:

Tree 4 Hope operates Hope Academy Guatemala. This is the first and only bilingual STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) school for girls in Guatemala. It provides the girls with a life-changing education to ensure they have the skills and resources to thrive in today's world. They offer full and partial scholarships to any student who cannot afford the regular tuition. The school has grown from one kindergarten classroom in 2019 to a modern school building with over 100 girls in pre-K through 6th grade. The students had an especially difficult time during the COVID-19 pandemic because of the lack of electricity in many homes and other places.

Tree 4 Hope also supports Miguel Magone orphanage and helps the village of El Aguacate, Guatemala, with food security, music education, psychological care, and community outreach.

This touched me because I have experienced as a woman how education can open the world. I just cannot imagine what wonderful opportunities there can be for these educated Guatemalan girls.

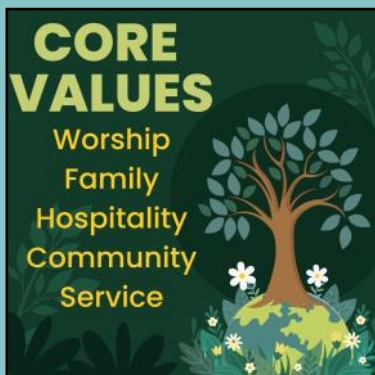
Also ask me about **Guatemalan Chica Bean coffee**. It's an important resource for the village and academy.
