Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

Thank you to everyone who participated in the Church Huddle on June 1. We had a terrific event and this is a report on the outcomes from that day.

After learning about the Twelve Keys to an Effective Church (written by Kennan Callahan), we rated New Life based on each of the twelve areas of focus:

Six Relational Keys:

- Specific, Concrete Missional Objectives
- Pastoral Care and Outreach
- Corporate, Dynamic Worship
- Significant Relational Groups
- Strong Leadership Resources
- Solid, Participatory Decision Making

Six Functional Keys:

- Several Competent Programs and Activities
- Open Accessibility
- High Visibility
- Adequate Parking, Land, and Landscaping
- Adequate Space and Facilities
- Solid Financial Resources

For the six relational keys, Callahan's method suggests finding the strengths and improving them even more. The presence of these keys in churches leads to satisfaction among parishioners. Although "Corporate, Dynamic Worship" scored the highest, the group decided that since this area is already going so well, and there is little to be improved upon, we should focus our efforts elsewhere.

"Pastoral Care and Outreach" scored almost the same as "Solid, Participatory Decision Making." The consensus seems to be that there are pastoral care ministries already in place but would be more effective with better communication. This includes doing better at making people aware of ministries that exist, like the prayer team, pastoral visitation, and communion brought to those who are homebound. "Pastoral Care and

Outreach” will continue to be lifted up and improved with communication and leadership.

To move forward, we want to expand 2-3 of our current relational strengths. After some discussion, the group decided to focus on these three areas:

“Significant Relational Groups” – having an adequate number of church relational groups, developing a sense of community within our groups, developing new groups and building interest in them.

“Strong Leadership Resources” – enabling our leaders to lead and be trusted, encouraging those with gifts to use them in leadership, define objectives for leaders that are measurable, focus on accomplishments instead of activities, recognize and acknowledge leaders for their efforts.

“Solid, Participatory Decision Making” – make wise, thoughtful decisions in relation to our goals and priorities, create a sense of openness and participation around the decision-making process, resolve church conflict through decision making process, streamline the church’s organizational structure through an appropriate number of committees and ministry teams.

For the six functional keys, Callahan’s method suggests finding the weaknesses and bolstering them. The absence of these keys in churches leads to dissatisfaction among parishioners. In moving forward, we want to improve 1-2 of our current functional weaknesses. The two lowest areas were chosen:

“High Visibility” – the physical visibility of the church property, the community grapevine visibility of the church, and the online visibility of the church.

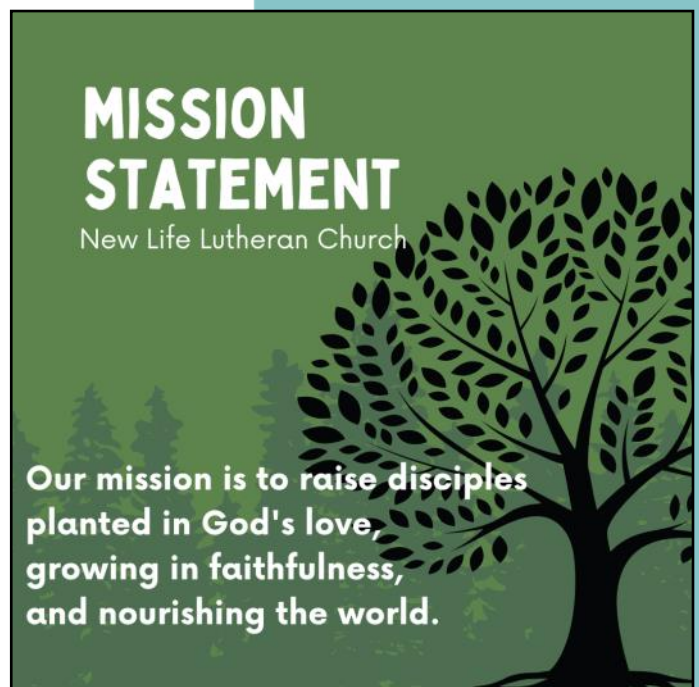
“Solid Financial Resources” – increasing generosity among the membership, establishing interest-bearing investment accounts, utilizing our property and facilities as an alternative source of revenue, managing our debt appropriately, looking for additional financial resources.

Visibility is the most important of these keys. It’s outward facing. It can include things like improving signage, our website, and social media.

More importantly, visibility also includes being known in the community (described by Callahan as the community grapevine). If we go out into the community and ask what they need, then we will know how to serve them better and what action we need to take (creating events, programs, etc.).

If we are more visible in the community, more people will come. If more people come, then we will have more financial resources. If we have more financial resources, then we can invest more in improving visibility. It becomes a positive cycle.

It was a very successful Church Huddle with lots of good input from those who participated. It was also the beginning of a longer strategic planning process that will begin in August. The strategic planning team will take these broad categories and form an action plan with checkpoints along the way to make changes in these important areas.

Saturday, September 21 is our next Orange Street litter pickup.

Thanks to everyone who brought your aluminum to church for the youth camp fund. We received over \$66 for the sale of that aluminum. More important is that many pounds of soda cans, aluminum foil and pans, and cat food cans will be recycled into new products and not become a part of the waste stream. For easier storage and transporting, we crush the soda cans and aluminum pans, and take off the tabs to collect separately for Mac Donald House fundraising. MacDonald House is located in the Houston Medical Center to house families of children from out of town who are here for cancer treatments. We also remove paper from the cat food cans for paper recycling. This is an ongoing project. Cans can be left in the Juul fellowship hall or by the library in the administration building.

I was recently touched by a quote on one of my many bookmarks from World Wildlife Federation (WWF). **"The Earth has music for those who listen"** It really resonated with me. (I couldn't resist the pun. It's the only word that really fits for me.) It was attributed to George Santayana, aka Jorge Augustin Nicolas Ruiz de Santayana, a Spanish- American philosopher, poet, humanist. He is also credited with saying another of my favorite quotes, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

I was curious about this philosopher whom I had not heard of. His philosophy seems to include a great appreciation for nature and what is real, but without regard for God. He believed in evolution and felt the development of man was in relation to his adapting to his natural environment. He calls himself an aesthetic Catholic because he loved the beauty of Catholic art and the community but without the spiritual faith. I don't understand how anyone can appreciate nature without faith in God. To me the more I learn about science and nature the more evidence there is of our great Creator. 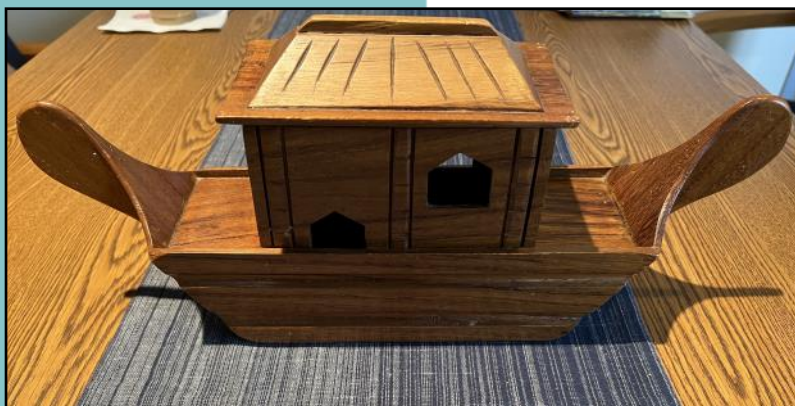
News from Godly Play Evelyn Baldauf

Hi! Welcome to the Godly Play section of this newsletter. Wow! It’s so hard to believe that the training for Godly Play has come and gone, and at last we are doing the work of getting ready for Vacation Bible School and Rally Day. There is so much to tell and so much to do and so many people to thank this may be a little longer!

First, thank you so much for sending me as part of the team with Pastor Faulkner, Jan Bigham, our all things Montessori expert, and myself who will have the privilege of being the first Storyteller for Godly Play for New Life Lutheran.

The time that we spent at the conference was amazing and we met so many people, some of which had been doing Godly Play for years and others, like us who were newbies to the program and the philosophy behind the program that emphasizes the seeking “to nurture the deepest part of children’s hearts” and to “help them become aware of the mystery of God’s presence in their life.” In Godly Play these goals are taught and nurtured through exposure to God’s actions and words as taught in the Bible through telling Bible stories like Creation, The Flood; parables like The Sower; and the Liturgical actions of the church such as Baptism, Advent and so on. The emphasis is always on the child and the space for the classroom is designed to be worshipful as well as educational. There are stories, children’s responses to the story, and a feast. If this sounds familiar, it is based on our church experience. We come to church, hear the word, respond to the word and then celebrate the word with communion. For us, in our congregation, we will be following our church calendar which will determine the order of the Godly Play lessons and will also impact what materials we need first so there will be changes to our donation list. On a side note, during Vacation Bible School, Pastor and I will be alternating sharing special stories from Godly Play to the children attending.



We have been so blessed to have many people in the congregation already donating to Godly Play through money donations, materials, and prayers. We had a list of supplies that we were looking for but in many ways it was very confusing not only to you but also to me. It was so interesting to see how the materials from the list were being used in the Godly Play program. So now it makes more sense and I’ll be able to adjust the list better.

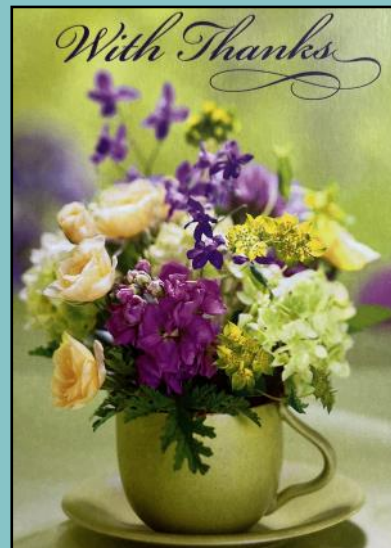
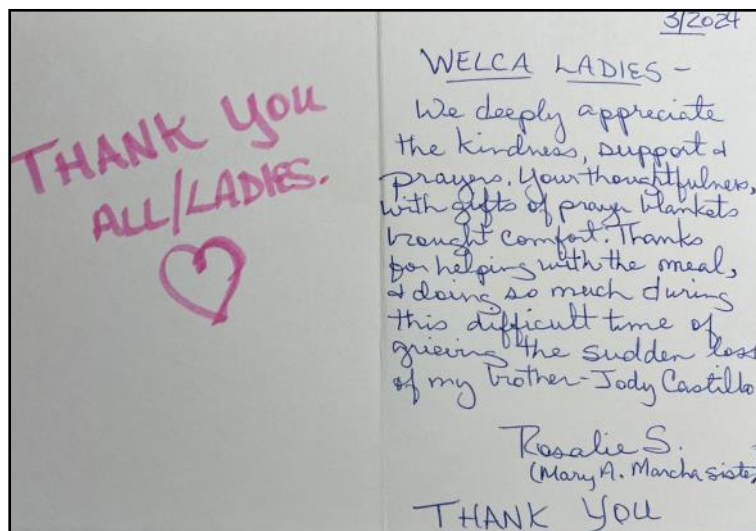
