Pastor's Ponderings...

...for people like us... in times like this...

"March Madness — When Every Sunday is EASTER Sunday!"

Dear Friends and Disciples @ New Life,

March madness? Here's what St. Luke reported... "

But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen!"


March Madness; and sometimes in April! How would you feel? It does get sorted out. It's our turn. March Madness will be here soon... the "Super Tuesday" kind, the Spring break kind... the ending of Lent kind... the NCAA basketball playoffs kind and finally the Holy Week and Easter kind... and "March Madness" may just be an appropriate title for the Easter celebration...

I saw the movie, "Risen" recently and it depicts the actions of the Roman government, the Jewish Temple leaders and Jesus' disciples coming to grips with his death, burial, resurrection and what follows... and in a sense... the story is still ongoing! It's why we gather for worship on Sundays... thus every Sunday is Easter Sunday!

There's an old story told of a dad and mom driving to worship on Easter morning...the children were so excited for lots and lots of reasons...here's how the conversation went in the car...

Dad began to tell the Easter story to the children..."you remember that Jesus loves us and that he died on the cross for the sins of the world, right?" And the children said, "Yes, we know Jesus loves us..." Then mom said, "Well, this is the day we celebrate Jesus coming back to life!" Just then the 3-year-old, Corey, piped up from the back asking..."Will JESUS be in church today?" So what do we say to those we love when we are asked a question like this? "Of course he will," we respond because we know that when two or more are gathered in Jesus' name, he is present in us and with us... his Word provides the certain guarantee that he is present... the waters of our baptism remind us that God's son is with us forgiving us daily and when we come to his table and eat and drink together in faith... we are refreshed and empowered by his very presence in our lives... it's the kind of thing that makes us rush to worship on Easter because we know he is there... and yet the great irony is that the whole story began with the announcement... "you are looking for Jesus... he's not here...."

So, come join in the 'madness' and let God's peace take over your life! People show up for Easter because they know something "special" happened and it is going to happen again! The music will be magnified... the songs will reflect God's glory and in the meantime lots of preparation (40 days of Lent, new clothes, hearty breakfast, trumpets and a smiling choir, etc.) are being tended to for the unfolding of the day... Family and faith go hand in hand and this is a time when families come together and express their faith... a faith passed down for hundreds and hundreds of years... and now it's our turn... See you Sunday... as every Sunday is Easter!




Sign up today and reserve your Easter Lilies. They are \$12 each. Sign-up sheet is in the Narthex.

Living Cross - Live Flowers and Greenery

During Easter and Sunrise church services across the country this coming Sunday morning, many worshippers will participate in the poignant practice of "flowering the Easter cross." As part of this custom, each worshipper is invited to pick out a fresh flower from an assortment of lilies, daisies, tulips, carnations and other spring delights, or may bring a flower from their garden at home. Then comes the meaningful moment when each individual approaches the cross—often on the lawn or perhaps at the altar—and stands before the cross to place their flower upon it with reflection and reverence. Often, families stand together at the cross, each picking out a special spot for their flower.

Like the unfolding of a worshipful orchestra, eventually the cross is completely covered in beautiful flowers in a brilliant array of color, light and lovely fragrance. A symbol of death, darkness, pain and hopelessness is transformed into something beautiful, new and alive in celebration of the Resurrection of Christ. This practice of creative Easter worship was no doubt inspired by the artistic world, since symbolic flowering crosses can be found in Christian art as early as the Sixth Century.







When your congregation purchases Eco-Palms through LWR, you know that the harvesters were paid fairly for them and that your purchase helps **protect important forests** and **sustainable livelihoods** in the harvesting communities.

Waving Eco-Palms makes a big difference in the lives of palm harvesters and their communities. Eco-Palms not only pay harvesters a fair price, they also promote sustainable harvesting practices that create long-lasting sources of income.

Why Eco-Palms?

In the typical palm trade:

- Large floral export firms encourage over-harvesting: they pay by volume for palms and then throw away large amounts that aren't export quality.
- Over-harvesting damages forests where the palm plants thrive.

Forests are depleted and palm-selling communities lose this important source of income.

How are Eco-Palms different?

- The palms are gathered and sold in a socially and environmentally just way.
- Harvesters are paid a **fair price** per palm based on quality, so they take fewer palms out of the forest, which protects important nature reserves.
- Community members sort, package and sell the palms themselves not via middlemen so more of the money paid for the palms stays with the people who worked the hardest to provide them.
- Because there is a steady market for the palms, locals are motivated to protect the forests (their source of income), ensuring harvests well into the future.

Harvesting communities receive 5-6 times the normal payment per frond.





of batting in Missouri City and bringing them to New Life in February. Cutting a roll into 25 quilt size pieces is an un-favorite 30 minute task for 92 year old Sarah but she does it anyway with the help of Judy Foucheaux, Viola Patschke and Deanna Gerber.

We are now making two pots of coffee now since there are more of us. People around two sets of long tables pin together the three layers of sheets, batting and tops to be sewn around the edges to hold the layers together. The sitters among us use crochet thread to tie the layers every eight inches. There are over 150 quilts ready to ship the day after Easter, and a half dozen more ready every Tuesday.



Last year, our 186 quilts went to the Philippines, Burkina Faso, Syria, Nepal, Dubai and Tanzania.

LENT - Did You Know?



- **1. What is Lent? According to the** Universal Norms for the Liturgical Year and the General Roman Calendar [.pdf]: Lent [is a liturgical season that] is ordered to preparing for the celebration of Easter, since the lenten liturgy prepares for celebration of the paschal mystery both catechumens, by the various stages of Christian initiation, and the faithful, who recall their own Baptism and do penance.
- 2. Where does the word "Lent" come from? The Catholic Encyclopedia notes: The Teutonic word *Lent*, which we employ to denote the forty days' fast preceding Easter, originally meant no more than the spring season. Still it has been used from the Anglo-Saxon period to translate the more significant Latin term *quadragesima* (French *carême*, Italian *quaresima*, Spanish, *cuaresma*), meaning the "forty days", or more literally the "fortieth day". This in turn imitated the Greek name for Lent, *tessarakoste* (fortieth), a word formed on the analogy of Pentecost (*pentekoste*), which last was in use for the Jewish festival before New Testament times.
- 3. When does Lent begin and end? The Universal Norms state: The forty days of lent run from Ash Wednesday up to but excluding the Mass of the Lord's Supper exclusive. This mean that Lent begins at 12:01 a.m. on Ash Wednesday and runs to just before the Mass of the Lord's Supper on the evening of Holy Thursday. As soon as the Mass of the Lord's Supper starts, it's a new liturgical season: Triduum.
- 4. Are the Sundays in Lent part of Lent? Yes. It runs from Ash Wednesday to Holy Thursday. No exceptions are made for Sundays. Furthermore: The Sundays of this time of year are called the First, Second, Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent [emphasis added]. The Sixth Sunday, on which Holy Week begins, is called, "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord."
- 6. Why is the number forty significant? Pope Benedict explains: Lent recalls the forty days of our Lord's fasting in the desert, which He undertook before entering into His public ministry. We read in the Gospel: "Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was hungry" (*Mt* 4,1-2). Like Moses, who fasted before receiving the tablets of the Law (cf. *Ex* 34,28) and Elijah's fast before meeting the Lord on Mount Horeb (cf. 1 *Kings*19,8), Jesus, too, through prayer and fasting, prepared Himself for the mission that lay before Him, marked at the start by a serious battle with the tempter [Message for Lent 2009].
- 7. What are the rules for fasting in Lent? Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast. The law of fast binds those who are from 18 to 59 years old, unless they are excused for a sufficient reason (e.g., a medical condition that requires more frequent food, etc.) According to the Church's official rules (as opposed to someone's personal summary of them): The law of fasting allows only one full meal a day, but does not prohibit taking some food in the morning and evening, observing—as far as quantity and quality are concerned—approved local custom [Apostolic Constitution Paenitemini, Norms, III:2]. The system of mitigated fasting that is required by law thus allows for "one full meal" and "some food" in the morning and evening. The Church's official document governing the practice of fasting does not encourage scrupulous calculations about how much the two instances of "some food" add up to, though obviously each *individually* is less than a full meal, since only one of those is allowed.
- 8. Do you have to give up something for Lent? If you do, can you have it on Sundays? The traditional custom of giving up something for Lent is voluntary. Consequently, if you give something up, you set the parameters. If you choose to allow yourself to have it on Sundays as to promote joy on this holy day, that is up to you.



- 11 We ask God to bless and inspire Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's leadership, especially in helping our church address the issues of racism, racial disparity in the criminal justice system, care for the incarcerated and their families, advocacy for those wrongly convicted, and support and guidance for those who enforce the law and work in the justice system.
- 12 We remember in our prayers and ask God to bless and guide the work of the seven young adults serving in the Young Adults in



- 13 In our baptism, we experience the freedom that can only come through the power of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. For this undeserved gift of love, we give thanks.
- 14 We give thanks to God for the generous grant the ELCA has received from the Lilly Endowment to help fund an initiative to address the financial and economic struggles that often prevent pastors from leading congregations effectively.
- 15 We remember in our prayers all those who support and empower international women leaders in the life and development of this church and our communities. We pray to be awakened to the power and capacity our sisters have in transforming the world in the name of Jesus Christ.
- 16 Whether gathered for a Lenten meal or worship, we pray that our thoughts and reflections will be on Jesus and that we will trust and follow Jesus no matter where he leads or how difficult the journey.
- 17 On this St. Patrick's Day, we give thanks to God for our brothers and sisters who respond to God's call to serve as missionaries in the world. We ask God to fill them with love and respect for the people and communities they serve and with a tireless enthusiasm to share the gospel.
- 18 The prayerful words of the psalmist in ancient times still holds meaning for our prayers today "Let your face shine upon your servant; save me in your steadfast love."
- 19 We remember in our prayers the leaders in our congregations rostered and lay who commit themselves to sharing the gospel, deepening our faith, and equipping and sending us to do God's work in the world.
- 20 *Palm Sunday* Christ defies our images of him as a conquering king, powerful religious leader or just another prophet. We pray that we receive, by faith, Jesus as our Savior, messiah, servant and son of God the fulfillment of God's loving promises to us.
- 21 Monday of Holy Week Mary of Bethany was extravagant in her love for Jesus and her anointing of him before his death. We pray that we too may not be shy or embarrassed in our witness and worship, especially in telling others of Jesus' life, suffering, death and resurrection for our sake.
- 22 We remember in our prayers the ELCA International Women Leaders scholarship recipients Abby Lai, Elisa Pérez-Trejo, Lynette Lee, Melissa Neo, Sarah Abendanon and Sthela Hanitrinirina, that God will bless them and guide and inspire their studies.
- 23 We ask God to grant us daily strength and courage to speak of our faith and act as the gospel urges us and to resist the temptation to stay quiet or hide the light of Jesus Christ.
- 24 *Maundy Thursday* It's difficult to be humble and serve people in this day and age, especially in a society that belittles such behaviors as signs of weakness. We ask God to remind us of Jesus' example when he washed the feet of his disciples and embolden us to do likewise for our neighbors and those in need.
- 25 *Good Friday* Again faced with the story of Jesus' betrayal, judgment, suffering, torture and disgraceful public death, we humble ourselves before God and plead for forgiveness, asking that God reassure us of Jesus' boundless, sacrificial love for all humanity.
- 26 *Vigil of Easter* We confess our times of disbelief and uncertain faith in Jesus and ask God to embolden us as witnesses imperfect as we are to run and share, as Mary Magdalene did, the good news of Jesus Christ in whom we have forgiveness and new life.
- 27 Easter Day Christ is risen! We rejoice and ask God's Spirit to dispel our doubts, fears and suspicions and fill us with faith and amazement over God's miraculous love for us.
- 28 This day and every day, we offer prayers of wonder and praise for the presence of God in our lives, especially when we least expect it or doubt God's power and creativity to effect change in our lives and world.
- 29 We remember in our prayers and ask God to bless and further the leadership development work of the Rev. Chad and Natalie Rimmer, ELCA missionaries in Senegal.
- 30 We give thanks for the poets of the church who speak from their heart, spirit and life experiences and inspire our faith and imagination through creative means.
- 31 We remember on this day when some states celebrate Cesar Chavez Day, the leaders, advocates and activists who are moved to work for the wellbeing and just treatment of all people, especially those who labor under difficult conditions and whose voices are often neglected.
