"A Christian is the most free lord of all, and subject to none; a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, subject to all."


On the Church





"72 Hour Lutheran" Checklist



Let's review recycling at New Life



There are paper recycling receptacles at many locations in each building. Please put ONLY paper in the containers and nothing contaminated with food or drink. It will be deposited in one of the paper recycling dumpsters behind the church. Please bring your paper from home as well. The sale of recycled paper is a fundraiser for the youth. <u>Cardboard does not go into</u>

the paper recycling. Set it aside and it will be recycled through curbside recycling. Food contaminated cardboard should be thrown away. (example: Pizza boxes) AND bring your old birthday and holiday cards to the church office to be sent to St. Jude's Hospital.

Aluminum Cans:

Another fundraiser for the youth is aluminum recycling. Please empty the cans completely. Before placing the cans in the bin, pull off the pop top and place it in the nearby container. In the Juull Building, there is a large plastic jar on the counter top for the pop tops. In the Administration Building and the Sanctuary there are small green bins by the sink for the pop tops. They are used for raising money for Ronald McDonald House Family Services. All clean aluminum can be recycled, foil wrap and pans as well.



Plastic, Glass, and Non-Aluminum Cans:

The green receptacle by the kitchen is for plastic, glass, and non-aluminum metal cans.

- Please do not put paper or plastic bags in it. No matter how careful we are, we may still contaminate the paper with food. Plastic bags do not go in curbside recycling. At the materials reclamation facility (MRF), they have to stop the sorting procedure several times a day due to the plastic film that gets wound up in the mechanism. Plastic bags can be taken back to any grocery store. That includes any bags or filmy plastic sheets, but not cling plastic food wrap. Some people bring plastic bags back to the church for use at Christian Helping Hands. There is also a bag hanging in the kitchen for miscellaneous uses.
- All plastic and glass bottles and juice and milk cartons can be recycled. Be sure they are empty, rinsed, and the lids put back on. On plastic containers, look for the triangle of chasing arrows with a number in the middle. If there is no number, throw it away. If the number is 6, throw it away. We can recycle numbers 1 through 5 and 7.
- Please do not buy any more Solo cups. They are number 6. Styrofoam is also number 6. In order to avoid disposable tableware, we have purchased sturdy plastic glasses that are dishwasher proof and we wash them as well as ceramic coffee cups and soup bowls. If you do not want to wash glasses, we do have some number one and five plastic cups. These can be recycled.
- We can't recycle plastic forks, knives, spoons, or straws. Whenever possible, use the stainless ware.



The slop bucket is for all food scraps to be composted. There are green coffee cans at each sink for convenience when making coffee or tea. When I get recycling, I gather up grounds and food scraps. All disposable plates and napkins go in the trash, but scrape leftovers into the slop bucket first. When I take the recycling home, I sort and clean before recycling. Whatever sorting and rinsing is done at church is a big help to me. Thank you for caring for our environment and doing your part by recycling.



A Young Martin Luther

ABOUT MARTIN LUTHER

Driven to Defiance

"I would never have thought that such a storm would rise from Rome over one simple scrap of paper..." (Martin Luther)

Few if any men have changed the course of history like Martin Luther. In less than ten years, this fevered German monk plunged a knife into the heart of an empire that had ruled for a thousand years, and set in motion a train of revolution, war and conflict that would reshape Western civilization, and lift it out of the Dark Ages.

Luther's is a drama that still resonates half a millennium on. It's an epic tale that stretches from the gilded corridors of the Vatican to the weathered church door of a small South German town; from the barbarous pyres of heretics to the

technological triumph of printing. It is the story of the birth of the modern age, of the collapse of medieval feudalism, and the first shaping of ideals of freedom and liberty that lie at the heart of the 21st century.

But this is also an intensely human tale, a story that hurtles from the depths of despair to the heights of triumph and back again. This is the story of a man who ultimately found himself a lightning conductor of history, crackling with forces he could not quite comprehend or control.

For Luther, in a life full of irony, would find himself overwhelmed by his own achievements. As his followers sought to build a new and just Europe around him, he could only turn on them in frustration, declaring that his - and their - only goal should be Heaven.

Martin Luther stands as a hero, the man who built the bridge between the two halves of the last millennium, the Medieval and the Modern. His tragedy was that he would never find the courage to cross it himself.

Martin Luther was born into a world dominated by the Catholic Church, which holds spiritual dominion over all the nations of Europe. For the keenly spiritual Luther, the Church's promise of salvation is irresistible - caught in a thunderstorm, terrified by the possibility of imminent death, he vows to become a monk.



Selling indulgences

But after entering the monastery, Luther becomes increasingly doubtful that the Church can actually offer him salvation at all. His views crystallize even further with a trip to Rome, where he finds that the capital of Catholicism is swamped in corruption.

Wracked by despair, Luther finally finds release in the pages of the Bible, when he discovers that it is not the Church, but his own individual faith that will guarantee his salvation.

With this revelation, he turns on the Church, attacking its practice of selling Indulgences in the famous 95 Theses. The key points of Luther's theses were simple, but devastating: a criticism of the Pope's purpose in raising the money, "he is richer than Croesus, he would do better to sell St Peters and give the money to the poor people...", and a straightforward concern for his flock, "indulgences are most pernicious because they induce complacency and thereby imperil salvation".

Luther was not only a revolutionary thinker, he would also benefit from a revolutionary technology: the newly invented machinery of printing. A single pamphlet would be carried from one town to another, where it would be duplicated in a further print run of thousands. Within three months, all Europe was awash with copies of Luther's 95 Theses.

Martin Luther had inadvertently chosen unavoidable conflict with what was the most powerful institution of the day, the Catholic Church.

What it means to be Lutheran

June 30, 2016



Lutherans don't often garner much media attention. In this country we don't make up a big segment of the population. When groups of Lutherans began arriving on these shores in the 18th and 19th centuries, they tended to stay in their nationality and language groups and didn't assimilate completely into the surrounding culture. We kept to ourselves and so went relatively unnoticed. Lutherans, with some exceptions, weren't part of the political or economic elite. There are both benefits and problems because of this. More later.

Our state of relative obscurity is about to change. In 16 months we'll mark the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. For a brief time a spotlight will be turned on Lutherans in this country and around the world. Documentaries will be produced and aired, seminars will be held and, particularly if Oct. 31, 2017, is a slow news day, the media is going to seek us out and ask us to explain ourselves. When the local newspaper, radio or TV station comes knocking on our door, what are we going to say?

In our churchwide conversation about priorities for the ELCA, we have been asking what it means to be Lutheran. We aren't as good as we could be about giving a clear answer to that question. We speak about grace, about our work in advocacy, about the relief and development work we do, about our inclusiveness and diversity—though I believe these last two are more aspirational than actual—about our ecumenical and interreligious dialogues and relationships. These are true and beautiful and important. They are not exclusively Lutheran.

Many religious and secular organizations are deeply committed to serving the vulnerable and working for justice and peace. The ELCA couldn't engage in ecumenical and interreligious partnerships if there were no ecumenical or interreligious partners. What is distinctive about us then?

When trying to define Lutheran identity we sometimes default to cultural types—northern and central European heritage, a certain kind of hymnody, even standard entrees at church dinners. I'm not dismissing the faithful witness of the millions of Lutheran immigrants who left Europe to start a new life on this continent. They built churches and hospitals and universities. They cared for the poor, the widow and the orphan.

They also lived in close-knit ethnic communities that, at first, helped maintain the Lutheran confessional movement. That is the benefit I noted above. The problem is that the Lutheran movement in this country has become overidentified with a particular cultural expression.

If we manage to not describe ourselves by a particular culture, we have the tendency of describing Lutheranism as a set of behaviors — we are inclusive, we work for justice, we stand with the vulnerable, we are an inviting church. Please, God, let it be so.

But the danger is we can slip into what scholasticism called "fides formata." Today we might say faith formation: not in the sense of a living faith that has first been given as a gift, but that correct action leads to faith. Either of these expressions—cultural or behavioral—can result in what Martha Stortz, a professor at Augsburg College, Minneapolis, calls the "presumptive we" that leads to the "othering you." Those in the majority assume their experience is universal and those outside of that experience aren't fully part of the tradition.

Neither culture nor behavior define what is distinctive about the Lutheran movement. It's our understanding of the gospel. The gospel word creates faith. The gospel word is judgment and promise. Faith created by this gospel word sets people free to serve the neighbor. The church's proper work is to proclaim the gospel word. You know, in the end, it's all about God's fierce and tender love that drives us to the cross, and there, at the very point of death, gives us life. The world deserves to hear the gospel — when the spotlight is on us, and when it is not.



- 28 As followers of Jesus Christ, we pray that our spirit and actions express humility, concern for our neighbor and a desire to first honor and serve others rather than ourselves.
- 29 As congregations prepare programs for fall, we ask God to bless their planning and leadership. We pray their efforts and creativity will encourage people of all ages in their faith and touch the hearts of those who yet seek or hunger for the good news found in Jesus Christ.
- 30 Following God's ways and trusting in God's love, our hearts are firm and steady, and we are not afraid; for these blessings we give praise and thanksgiving to God.
- 31 We remember in our prayers seasonal workers seeking new employment, moving or facing the emotions that come with change. We pray that our congregations be inviting and welcoming for people in transition, that we are communities of faith offering acceptance, stability, friendship and support.
