"Pastors Appreciation Month" seems to have taken hold and so this month I will be remembering those who have died in Christ and contacting those pastors who are still alive in the kingdom who have been a good pastor to me...

You may want to do the same... here are some who have been good pastors to me;

- 1) Rev. George Nieman /St. Paul's Youngstown, OH for making me memorize the books of the Bible and Luther's Q&A's in the Small Catechism;
- 2) Rev. Dr. Roy J. Enquist, TLU faculty for pointing out things in my life I didn't know and pointing me toward seminary with both sincerity and boldness;
- 3) Rev. Dr. Augie Wenzel, TLU campus pastor for showing me grace as we walked a deceased freshman's parents into his dorm room to pack up his belongings after he was killed in an auto accident the first month of school in the Fall of 1970;
- 4) Rev. Dr. Art Haimerl /Ascension LC in Columbus, OH for showing me that my integrity has nothing to do with pretending to be someone I'm not or to be anything like him;
- 5) Rev. Dr. Fred Meuser /Trinity Seminary President for seeing the better things in me when it was easy to point out all that was wrong and that it's OK to walk off into the woods hand in hand with the one you love;
- 6) Rev. Dr. Ralph Doermann /Trinity Seminary faculty for insisting I go to Israel to engage in a summer of archaeology and the value of what the "ancient" world continues to teach us!
- 7) Rev. Dr. Rom Sumter / First Christian Church/ Huntsville, TX for guiding this young pastor for 5.5 years of 'mission' work in east Texas and showing me there is a path to becoming a 'holy man!'
- 8) Rev. Karl Gronberg / Gethsemane in Austin, for demonstrating Scandinavian piety without requiring it of me and being a steady beacon of faithfulness and grace since 1975 to this past May at Rachel & Cord's wedding!
- 9) Rev. Paul Blom for his support and guidance and insisting I remain on the clergy roster following a divorce;
- 10) Rev. V. George Brookover who showed me day-to-day pastoral details and the need to self-differentiate and self-define in a changing church...

Everyone needs a pastor. I thank God for those who have allowed me to be theirs!

SPIRITUAL GIFTS - GOD'S GIFTS TO OUR CONGREGATION - YOU

God has given each Christian the gift of one or more special abilities called spiritual gifts. As Church, we use our collective gifts for the purpose of unifying the body of Christ and for the growth of God's Kingdom. *That's whole-life stewardship*. Your church council has been asking for you to complete a spiritual gifts survey so we can profile our congregation's spiritual strengths and weaknesses. But what are spiritual gifts? How do you know which gifts you have? How do you use them?

In contrast to talents or strengths, which are also marked by ease, competence and job, spiritual gifts are further characterized by serving one another with God's strength, and by glorifying God in Jesus Christ. As Christians, we discover and deploy the special abilities God has given us in areas of ministry where they will be most effective for the good of the entire church body. If you're friendly, but not a public speaker, then the Church benefits more from you greeting and chatting with others than from lesson reading. Everyone brings something to the spiritual table of gifts; it's the amalgamation of our gifts that makes up the moving parts in the one body of Christ's Church. *That's whole-life stewardship*.

Peter verifies the existence of spiritual gifts in I Peter 4:10. Through these sections of scripture, we learn that all Christians have been given at least one spiritual gift. The purpose of spiritual gifts is twofold: (1) to unify Christians in their faith and (2) to produce growth within the church, both numerical and spiritual. These gifts are to be used out of love for one another, and in service to one another.

Like other presents, it is impossible to fully appreciate and make use of our spiritual gifts until they have been opened. What spiritual gifts has God given you?

FAITH

- You have an unshakable confidence in God, even in the face of impossibilities.
- ♦ You believe God will act in a situation in spite of evidence to the contrary.
- ♦ You depend upon God's resources and guidance for all things.
- ♦ You diligently seek God's will in your life, for others, your community, and the world.
- ♦ You are compelled to learn about and use the power of intercessory prayer.
- ♦ You see the Spirit at work and trust the Spirit's leading without knowledge of the path.
- ♦ You undertake prayer requests that seem mountainous.
- \diamond You offer hope in the face of any discouraging situation and listen to God for guidance.

APOSTLESHIP

- ♦ You know what is involved in building and growing a healthy body of Christ.
- ♦ You see leadership of missions or ministries as part of your spiritual life.
- \diamond You have a sense that Christ has called you to build up His church.
- ♦ You look for ways to improve your ability to express your faith.
- ♦ You are compelled to find new ways of communicating God's love to people.
- ♦ You contemplate just where God might be urging you to go.
- You seek God in prayer for insight and purpose.

HOSPITALITY

- ♦ You enjoy inviting people over for dinner or a meal. You are welcoming to others.
- ♦ You often start conversations with people you don't know. You engage comfortably with strangers.
- ♦ You are compelled to care for the needy.
- ♦ You love people.
- ♦ You enjoy doing things for others.
- You a leader in your own home.
- ♦ You receive joy from helping other families and building relationships.
- You notice ways to make others more welcome and comfortable.

ADMINISTRATION

- ♦ You understand the structure and dynamics of the Church.
- ♦ You are motivated to lead others and are goal-oriented.
- ♦ Your spirituality motivates you in your accomplishments.
- ♦ You remain calm while addressing the frustrations of others. You listen patiently.
- ♦ You base decisions on what's best for the Church, not what's most convenient.
- ♦ You delegate to achieve maximum efficiency.
- You can discern true character and recognize a sloth.
- You are not deterred by confrontation.

EXHORTATION

- You are motivated to encourage believers to mature in Christ and grow spiritually.
- You speak of God's sovereignty and love believing in God's power and faithfulness.
- ♦ You express love through being available.
- ♦ You give hope by sharing the Biblical perspective.
- You are able to give thanks in all seasons and circumstances, including the darkest ones.
- ♦ You sympathize with the suffering and regard trials as opportunities for growth.
- ♦ You identify precepts and principles in God's Word and draw wisdom from them.
- ♦ You understand that time reading and studying the Word of God brings transformation.

GIVING

- ♦ You are highly motivated to conserve and share resources in order to meet needs.
- You take special delight in discovering and meeting the needs of others.
- ♦ You love God's people. You honor His creation. Thankfulness is important to you.
- ♦ Others, outside your family, think you are extremely generous.
- ♦ You prefer to operate anonymously in order to avoid recognition.
- ♦ You see yourself as a wise and thoughtful decision maker.
- ♦ You place value on your time and freely give it to help or serve others.
- ♦ You hardly ever spend more than you make and, consequently, rarely incur debt.
- ♦ You motivate others to give generously of themselves.
- ♦ You evaluate your spirituality in terms of resources, accountability, and dependability.

MERCY

- ♦ You are motivated to sense and respond to the emotional and spiritual needs of others.
- ♦ You consider your greatest traits to be kindness and gentleness.
- ♦ You **are humble** because you are sensitive and aware of your weaknesses and failures.
- ♦ Forgiveness of sin most important to you.
- ♦ You easily reach out to people who are suffering.
- ♦ You have a great capacity to love others.
- ♦ Your spirituality is an emotional confirmation of God's presence in your life.
- You are compelled to pray and believe that God responds to prayer.

LEADERSHIP

- ♦ You recognize your work and your position are by the appointment of the Lord
- ♦ You see yourself as a servant, first. You live to serve those you lead.
- ♦ You enjoy explaining, teaching, discussing and organizing.
- ♦ You motivate others to serve God's people.
- ♦ You work with diligence and possess the ability to discern true spiritual needs.
- ♦ You help others to grow in their ability to discern God's will for themselves.
- ♦ You have a vision and a willingness to help the church to grow and thrive.
- ♦ You have confidence to step forward and give direction to accomplish a task.
- You are thoughtful, self-controlled, and orderly.
- ♦ You are respected by the people.

EVANGELISM

- You receive joy from spreading the Gospel of Christ.
- ♦ You witness or talk about your faith to others openly and honestly.
- ♦ You are compelled to encourage others to accept Christ.
- ♦ You continually seek out relationships with those who don't know Jesus.
- ♦ You are usually outgoing and personable.
- You willingly engage non-believers in meaningful conversations about Jesus.
- ♦ Your faith-life is a solid rock of unshakable truth.
- ♦ You faithfully study the Word of God because researching truth is a source of great joy.
- ♦ You identify precepts and principles in God's Word skillfully.
- ♦ You meditate on Scripture because you want to draw wisdom from it.
- ♦ You understand that time reading and studying the Word of God brings transformation.

PROPHECY

- ♦ You are motivated to apply God's Word to expose sin and restore relationships.
- ♦ You have a deep capacity to trust God.
- ♦ You sense when spiritual compromises are being made and are compelled to take action.
- ♦ You feel that any solution that involves compromise is unacceptable.
- ♦ You are not easily swayed by emotions.
- ♦ You discern true motives because the Holy Spirit gives you divine insights.
- ♦ You are outspoken, sometimes brash; you tell it like it is. You easily discern hypocrisy.
- ♦ You are confident in your use of Scripture because Scripture is the only source of truth.


These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the church. Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.



- 1 Give thanks for our elders who share wisdom and inspiration, pass their faith on to others and contribute so much to our communities; pray we continue to engage daily the wisdom and gifts of our elders, are attentive to the needs of people as they age and work to ensure no elder is neglected or forgotten.
- 2 Give thanks for the faith, gifts and service of people of all gender identities and gender expressions, and pray our congregations and communities are welcoming and affirming safe places for everyone to thrive.
- 3 Pray for situations and people who are on your mind today, be they cause for celebration and joy or concern and healing.
- 4 Feast of St. Francis Pray the behaviors and values we learn from our redeemer, teacher and true example Jesus Christ – are evident in our faith and daily life with respect to our neighbors, all living things and creation: simplicity and humility, respect and justice, compassion and love, and selfless generosity.
- 5 National Disability Employment Awareness Month reminds us that while our society and work places are making progress, they are not yet free of discrimination and obstacles for those who live with physical, sensory, intellectual, mental and developmental disabilities. Trusting in God's mercy and wisdom, pray we are advocates and agents for change that all God's people - with a wide spectrum of abilities and gifts - have equal opportunities for appropriate, equitable and supportive employment.
- 6 We remember people, communities and regions affected by recent flooding and widespread wildfires and pray for their safety, recovery and rekindling of hope and fortitude in the wake of devastation and loss.
