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Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

The month of October is here! I know you're anticipating the Fall, unless you don't like the Fall for some reason. Either way, it is here. As a pastor that cares about our communal life together in worship, I'm always thinking about what is coming ahead on the church calendar, also known as the liturgical calendar.

October does have one thing I know you are anticipating (as a good Lutheran should): Reformation Sunday. Reformation Day is always October 31, but it is usually commemorated on Reformation Sunday, whatever the last Sunday on the calendar happens to be. This year, that is October 30.

Some people see Reformation Sunday as a big pep rally for the Lutheran Church. Others might highlight the severance our forebears made with the Roman Catholic church, officially signaling the birth of the Protestant movement. I prefer to look at it a different way.

When I consider the Reformation, it was about reforming the church. And reform is evergreen. The church is always in need of shedding its skin (or perhaps sin) and being renewed in its focus for ministry.

I remember a seminary professor who asked us this question:
What kind of church does this world need?

That question has stuck with me for some time. What a fertile question. It gives us a chance to consider the needs of the world. What is the status of our world these days? Where is there hatred, violence, and chaos? Where is there famine, disease, and scarcity? Where is there hopelessness, illiteracy, and neglect?

Our world is filled with these things. Some of them are right under our local noses. Surprisingly you don't have to drive far to encounter some of these needs. So what kind of church is needed to face the needs of our world?

I think you could say lots of things. You could go lots of different directions and still answer this question in a satisfactory way.

The world needs a church that is loving, so loving that it sees every living thing as part of God's holistic creation and takes every chance to embody God's love for the cosmos.

The world needs a church that is adaptive, ready to abandon the old, tired ways of organizational thinking for new ways that bring life and vitality.

The world needs a church that is Christ-centered, focused on the words and ministry of Jesus and how they can bring transformation to our world today.

The world needs a church that is compassionate, never using our status or position in the world to bring harm, but only to bring healing to those who are over-looked.

The world needs a church that is self-sacrificing, willing to freely share its property, buildings, and money so that others can be better off than they were before.

The list goes on and on. I hope you have your own way of answering the question, because it is an important one. Because really, the question is not about the church, the question is about you and I.

What kind of person does this world need? How do I live my life more faithfully for the sake of the world?

My heart always goes back to the sacraments and the assembly. So my answer would be: "The world needs a church that continually gathers around God's story and table, and then embodies that story and food for the life of the world." I think telling a better story and sharing food is what the world needs from us the most.

What does the world need New Life Lutheran Church to be? I invite you to ponder this question with me.

Lutheran World Relief in Ukraine

New Life Lutheran Church contributed \$3,781 to LWR Ukrainian relief in June.

We joined Lutheran World Relief to help our Ukrainian neighbors in need.

Our congregation has shown up for our neighbors who are suffering in abundant and overwhelming ways. We saw our Ukrainian neighbors fleeing in the harsh winter cold, children and belongings in tow, and our love welcomed them with quilts and kits. We saw refugees separated from loved ones, in strange new countries, and our generosity provided them with emergency supplies and support to rebuild their lives after destruction.

Through your generosity, our congregation has become a part of something much bigger than ourselves.

Our gifts shared through Lutheran World Relief have meant that families fleeing war have:

- **LWR Quilts and Care Kits.** We've helped ship nearly \$1 million worth of LWR Quilts and Care Kits to provide comfort to neighbors in Ukraine and Poland.
- **Shelter and community.** More than 15,000 of the most vulnerable people who fled for safety within Ukraine have a safe place to stay because of our support.
- **Access to cash to support their children.** Ukrainians who have fled to Poland have received emergency cash vouchers to help with rent, health care and other necessities.
- **Life-saving medical care and supplies.** In addition to providing desperately needed care and supplies, our congregation is helping to send medical teams to areas where there is a critical shortage of health care.
- **Mental health resources.** War and conflict can have devastating impacts on not only the physical health of those in the crossfire but can also have long lasting mental health impacts. Our congregation is helping to provide resources to support these often-hidden wounds of war.

And most importantly, because of our congregation, families fleeing war have hope.

Our love is making a powerful difference around the world in the lives of our Ukrainian neighbors. **Thank you for sharing God's love when it was needed most.**

Sunday School is in Session

Christian learning is life-long. Our church has a variety of learning opportunities available for every student from the very young to the very experienced on Sunday mornings at 9:15 AM. Most classes meet during the school year (August through May) with other opportunities for learning taking place during other seasons of the year.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH CLASSES:

Classes for younger students meet upstairs in the Fellowship Hall building and include learning about God, making friends, arts and crafts, and lots of fun.

3 year olds, Pre-K, Kindergarten and 1st graders: The young ones are enjoying learning about the Bible through Sparks Online. These students are learning about the Old Testament in the Sparks Story Bible with fun arts and crafts!

Frontier Waste has produced a new booklet for Pearland residents that includes everything you need to know about curbside waste and recycling collections. It is available at the Keep Pearland Beautiful (KPB) office in the Stella Roberts Recycling Center (SRRC) and the church office. You can get it on your phone by scanning the QR code on this page.



Thanks to those who work in the church kitchen for cleaning and sorting the recyclables as they turn up. It is a big help to me when I take them home to sort for recycling. Our recycle bin takes plastics that are marked with the number 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, or 7 in the triangle of chasing arrows. We cannot recycle 6's, polystyrene. Please do not buy or use Styrofoam products. Not only are they not recyclable, they are an environmental nightmare. Plastics do not biodegrade. They break down into smaller and smaller pieces. They are consumed by wildlife and eventually humans as well. Styrofoam is difficult to handle because it breaks up so easily and is so light that it blows everywhere. There is hope. My daughter in Sherbrooke, Canada sent me pictures of my grandchildren getting ready to march in the local Climate Day Parade. My grandson, Kerian, had prepared a pole of Styrofoam objects with "Recycle me" written on them. Maybe some day we will be able to as well. **Best practice is still to avoid using single use plastics.** Our green bin by the kitchen also takes glass



containers and tin cans. Paper goes in a separate container in the hall leading to the kitchen. The bin marked cans is for aluminum cans, foil and pans. The bucket is for food waste and left overs for compost.
