

#### Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

November has great things in store. I am looking forward to this month. Possibly because of all the changes in the liturgical calendar. The church's connection to time has been a resonant part of my spiritual journey. November marks the turning over of a new leaf in liturgical time.

November begins with All Saints' Sunday. Once upon a time during my doctoral studies, I wrote a 20-page paper on All Saints' Day. Just for fun, I opened the document from 2008. Here's an excerpt: "The need for an All Saints' Day arose in the third century due to an overpopulated sanctoral cycle. In the early church, martyrs were highly honored and remembered for their ultimate sacrifice. As the number of martyrs increased while the early church was persecuted, soon the amount of martyred saints outnumbered the days in the calendar. The solution was to create one all-encompassing day to recognize and honor all the saints, many of whom were forgotten or overlooked."

All Saints' Sunday will be special at New Life this year, not only for our remembrance of loved ones, but also for the baptism of Melissa James (my first baptism!).

Sunday, November 13 is one last green day for the liturgical and calendar year (the Twenty-third Sunday after Pentecost). It is here that things begin to turn toward the beginning of the end.

The color of the day goes back to white on Sunday, November 20 for Christ the King Sunday (or Reign of Christ Sunday as I sometimes like to call it). This is the New Year's Eve of the liturgical calendar as we anticipate the start of a new year the first Sunday of Advent.

Before we cross over into Advent, we have a national holiday that doesn't necessarily get much attention from the church's calendar. Thanksgiving is Thursday, November 24. My family will be joining my extended family for food and relaxation. I'm sure many of you will be doing the same. Besides the turkey, football, and Friday sales, Thanksgiving is an opportunity to be thankful. I'm reminded of the word we use sometimes for Holy Communion, also known as Eucharist. This word comes

to us from the Greek εὐχαριστία which translates literally as "thanksgiving." We begin our communion with the words, "Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise." Sharing communion is deeply connected to thanksgiving. I pray that your Thanksgiving gatherings will be transformed into little Eucharists as you reflect on how much we have to be thankful for.

Sunday, November 27 marks the beginning of the liturgical season of Advent. There are four Sundays in the season of Advent, leading up to the completion of the season on Christmas Eve. The word "advent" means "coming." It comes from the Latin word *adventus* which is used to describe the arrival of a deity, the first visit of a new king or conqueror, or the enthronement of an emperor.

In our church, Advent marks the beginning of a new liturgical year. Oddly enough, Advent is primarily about the end of time. A common misunderstanding is that Advent is mainly a time to get ready to celebrate Christmas. However, the primary focus is Christ's second coming.

Advent is concerned with the future of the Risen One. A central theme is Jesus' judgment and victory over all enemies. Advent is the celebration of God's promise that, through Christ, all things will be made new. The beginning of the liturgical year, then, takes our thinking to the very end of things. There is a tension between the future and the past. We celebrate the fulfilling of God's purpose as we remember the first coming of our Savior and anticipate Jesus' second coming.



As we both remember and prepare for our Savior's arrival, we will gather for midweek worship on Wednesday evenings (beginning on November 30). The familiar songs from Holden Evening Prayer and a message will draw us together and ground our preparations. Make plans to join us as we journey this season of thankfulness and anticipation. November has great things in store!

I'm reading "Squeezing Prayer Into a Busy Life" and this caught my eye while searching for a short read to the punch booklet which is located in the Narthex reading rack. The focuses are:

- Enriching your prayer life
- Creating your own prayer experience
- Making a commitment once a day for prayer

The one that resonated with me is, "Let the events of your day be springboards for conversations with God." Here's my take on this...

We all have our own style, such as reading a passage from the Bible or getting a daily devotional via online or a prayer group for inspiration. Are you a person who has a particular prayer time? Do you have a favorite place, do you kneel, are you with someone next to you or on the phone with someone, eyes closed, hands clasped together, do you say your prayer silently or out loud? So many choices we have that there should be no excuse from saying a daily prayer.

I usually pray when I'm headed to work because there is so much that I come across whether I'm on the bus or driving into downtown. I may see a car broken down, a car wreck, someone riding on a bike no matter the weather because that is their only form of transportation to work, or people walking/jogging for exercise, and the first responders making their way through traffic, students waiting for a school bus, or a group of kids walking to school. The individuals I pray a lot for are 18-wheeler drivers because they are constantly challenged by aggressive drivers. The one truck driver I know is Floyd Brown, you are an amazing driver! I also pray for the homeless, perhaps it is their choice to live on the streets, but I often wonder what their story is. I pray for everyone, known or unknown to me.

Maybe you think your prayer is mundane, not so! God listens to us all and always. Thank you church family for your prayers past, present, and future. This sentence is an excerpt, "God is our perfect Parent, who knows perfectly well that your falls and fumbling's in prayer are simply steps in your progress toward a deeper union with God."

Lastly, I want to say our prayers have been answered, we have Pastor Clayton making every effort to put new life in New Life, to our new volunteers and the repeaters who have not missed a beat, and to our congregation for recognizing the importance of Church Council members.

I'm sure you're enjoying the cooler weather as much as I am. Beware. Some animals are thinking it's time to seek warmer quarters nearby and your garage, house, or attic may seem a good choice. Last winter I had 4 mice move in and now I have a huge opossum in my attic. The mice can come in a very small hole, but this guy must have come through the garage attic. Now is a good time to check all around the house and on the roof for any opening for a possible wildlife entry. Squirrels have also been known to cause big problems and damage in a home.

Last year I knew something was amiss when I saw the damage in my pantry and the hole on top of my flour canister plus droppings left behind. The exterminator told me mice feast where they are and leave a mess. Rats like to take things back to their nest, not much spore left behind.

Whatever the animal, it could bring disease and parasites in addition to the mess and destruction. Opossums don't attack, but threaten by baring teeth and hissing. They also play dead. Animal Control told me they have a very sensitive sense of smell and that putting out some water with cayenne pepper in it may cause them to vacate. My next-door neighbor's grandson just came over and put a trap with cat food bait in it up in my attic. We'll see if I catch anything. I hope that after this I can continue to observe wildlife in nature. As I told my children, pets are welcome indoors. Wildlife belongs in its natural habitat. All forms of life are God's gift and act according to their own nature.


