

### Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

"Images from the Ash Wednesday liturgy are spoken over bodies not only in church buildings at the beginning of Lent but also outdoors in all seasons of the year: "We commit this body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust" (ELW, p. 284). In the funeral liturgy, such words are spoken after the body is laid in the grave and as earth is cast onto the coffin, or as ashes are placed in the earth or into a columbarium. Each year, the Ash Wednesday liturgy offers every member of the church words and a gesture that seem to have arrived, ahead of time, from our own funeral liturgy. Earth is placed on our bodies, scriptural words about the inevitable decomposition of our bodies are spoken over us: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Among the many things that Ash Wednesday accomplishes is a small-scale, ritualized, near-death experience." (Excerpt from Worship Guidebook for Lent and Three Days, Augsburg Fortress, 2009, p. 18)

In seminary I had a systematic theology professor who often welcomed us to class with these words: "Greetings, frail creatures of dust!" Now, that may seem like an odd way to welcome people, but it has a theological underscoring that is significant. In the end, after all is said and done, we go back to being what we were all along – dust.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent in our liturgical calendar. It occurs 46 days before Easter. The precise date of Ash Wednesday is always moveable, falling on a different date each year because it is dependent on the date of Easter. Why 46 days? According to the gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the desert before the beginning of his public ministry. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of this 40-day liturgical period of prayer and fasting. Why are there an extra six days? Because there are six Sundays during the season of Lent, and every Sunday is the day of resurrection (a little Easter). On Sundays the fast of Lent is broken in celebration of the resurrection.

Ash Wednesday gets its name from the practice of placing ashes on the forehead as a sign of mourning and repentance to God. The ashes used are typically created from the burnt palms of the previous year's Palm Sunday services.

Historically, Ash Wednesday and the following season of Lent was the time of final preparations for baptism. Catechumens, people desiring to join the church and receiving instruction about the Christian faith, experienced an intense time of prayer, fasting, exorcisms, and teaching. Finally, at dawn on Easter Sunday, after an all-night Vigil, the catechumens were baptized and welcomed into the body of Christ by participating in the Eucharist for the first time. Ash Wednesday was the beginning of a season of life, death, and renewal.

But why do we have to be so morbid about it? Because no matter how much wealth, no matter how many material possessions, no matter how much plastic surgery, no matter how much exercise and fitness, no matter how much success, no matter how much fame and notoriety, in the end, we go back to being what we were all along – dust.



This season of Lent will feature a sermon series entitled, "Belonging." Together we will ponder what it means to belong to and participate in the body of Christ.



It has been an incredible journey of growth and love, but it does not end here. I love you New Life for all you have done for me and allowing me to serve you for many seasons.










# Join us for a pancake supper!

Remember, WE are the church.



### Environews Helen Beckman

It's tree planting time in Gulf Coast, Texas. I hope some of you were able to get a tree or two at Saturday's tree giveaway. On the other hand, you may have heard on the news about a tree eradication program. Most gardeners know about invasive species and the Chinese tallow is definitely invasive.

According to the Texas Invasive Species Institute, the Chinese tallow was introduced into the U.S. in the 1700's for ornamental purposes. Its waxy berries have been used for making soap, seed oil, and candles. It has adapted so well that it displaces our native species. It can grow in full sun or complete shade. It will grow in most soils and near saline or swampy water. It is drought tolerant because of a deep taproot. Native plant species are out-competed for resources once the Chinese tallow becomes established. Its leaves and fruit are toxic to humans and cattle. Birds feed on the berries and distribute the seeds. Volunteers such as the Sierra Club members are often used by national parks and nature preserves to rid the forests of tallow trees. You can do your part by weeding the seedlings from your flower beds and gardens. Do not transplant them and replace any tallow trees you have with a similar native tree, such as the red mulberry that was given away Saturday or the Eastern redbud.

# Bethlehem Lutheran Church in New Orleans is Building Affordable Housing for the Community

Last year, Bethlehem Lutheran Church, a 135-year-old historically Black Lutheran Congregation, took on one of the most ambitious projects in our history - the construction of an ADA-accessible affordable housing project to benefit our neighbors and our neighborhood in partnership with the Tulane School of Architecture's URBANbuild program. We started this project with no money in the bank to make it happen, only a belief that the work was so compelling and the need so great that our community would find a way to make it possible. Now, the first home is complete and occupied, and we are beginning construction of the second house! This Spring, with your help, we will build the second of four new affordable housing units across from the church. Alongside our affordable housing program, we currently provide over 600 free meals a week through our Community Table Free Meal Program and Community Fridge. We believe that following Jesus leads us to make our block, neighborhood, and world better, and we hope you will join us to make that vision a reality.
