Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

Holy Week is a significant time for followers of Jesus. Time becomes transfigured, set apart, and holy. During Holy Week we remember that we are entering the most important week in the life of the church. This is the focal point of our Christian calendar.

Holy Week offers us a chance to put ourselves on the pathway beside Jesus. We walk through the last supper, the betrayal, the crucifixion, and the glorious resurrection. We have the chance to pattern our time in the same



flow of Jesus' last earthly days. The services this week are also called the Three Days. They consist of three different services, but they interconnect and form one cohesive liturgy that spans three separate days.

Palm Sunday. Before the Three Days, things get kicked off with a street parade celebration. But there is more than meets the eye. Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem is a parody. When Roman emperors entered a town, they were greeted with pomp, prestige, and accolades announcing the grand reign of the empire. Instead of powerful horses pulling a carriage, Jesus enters on a young donkey. The God of the poor and friend of the weak has arrived.

Maundy Thursday. The name comes from the Latin word mandatum, from which we get the English word mandate. We remember the last supper where Jesus reinterpreted the Passover feast. We remember Jesus washing the disciples' feet, taking the place of a servant. We remember the new commandment (or mandate) that Jesus gave. Love one another, just as I have loved you. People will know you by how you love. It begs the question, "How are you offering love to your neighbor?"

Good Friday. The name is somewhat oxymoronic. How can such a tragic, devastating event be labeled good? We remember the betrayal. We remember the arrest. We remember how all of the disciples deserted Jesus, abandoning him and denying his acquaintance. We remember the crucifixion, the horrible, shameful, cursed execution. We remember the burial and Jesus' end.

Easter Vigil. Some churches also gather for worship on Saturday evening of Holy Week. The Vigil begins outside,

around a fire. The gathering begins around a fire because people have gathered around fires since the beginning. The fire is a sign of how we have survived as long as we have as a species. The fire is the place of gathering and sharing stories and memories about the way things used to be.

The fire is also a subtle nod to where Peter found himself as he uttered the very words he swore he would never say. The Easter Vigil is also a service of baptism. It takes the stories of creation, renewal, rebirth, and resurrection, and, at the font, pours them over the baptismal candidates, immersing them in water and the word. In baptism we are connected to the death and resurrection of Christ. If you've ever attended an Easter Vigil service, you know how meaningful they can be. Perhaps New Life will offer one in the future.

And then comes Easter and the glorious resurrection and victory of Jesus Christ. The surprise is revealed. When God appeared to be defeated and Jesus was at his weakest, God's true power was on display. When Jesus was at his humanly weakest point, God was providing the strength to recreate the entire world.

The news is so good and so surprising that we need 50 days to celebrate. It took 40 days of Lent to prepare for this, and now we need even more time to rejoice in it. Welcome to the surprising season of Easter, more than one day can contain. And then comes the Ascension. And Pentecost.

I know it might not be possible to participate in every event during Holy Week, due to work, family, and other commitments.

But let me pastorally encourage you to do what you can to be present for the most significant week in the life of the church. Be present for what Jesus goes through. Listen to the crowds cheering. Taste the last supper. Watch and wait at the foot of the cross. Peek inside the tomb where the stone is rolled away.

Saturday, April 1 is Don't Mess With Texas Trash-Off. We will be participating with our quarterly Adopt-a-spot litter cleanup of Orange Street. Meet at the church at 8:30 AM. Supplies and snacks are provided. It usually takes us about two hours. Students can get volunteer hours for school or scouts.

Thursday, April 13 at 7 PM is Garden Lecture. The topic is Improving Home Gardens. You can watch on Keep Pearland Beautiful Facebook live, or watch videos on KPB Facebook of past lectures.

Saturday, April 22 is Earth Day! Some of us remember the mid-20th century when air pollution was quite visible with smoky inner-city skies, soot on window sills, cars, and shrubbery from incinerators and coal fires, cars and trucks belching exhaust. The word "smog", a combination of smoke and fog, was coined to describe Los Angeles. Our roadsides and fields became littered and dumps for our increase in disposables. Industries found it convenient to dispose of waste in rivers or nearby pits. Rachel Carson's book, Silent Spring, in 1962 made the general public aware of the connection between pollution and health. There were always individuals and groups who acted for a cleaner safer environment, but to be really effective their goals needed to be more mainstream and more universally accepted.

Senator Gaylord Nelson, junior senator from Wisconsin is known as the founder of Earth Day. Growing up he had enjoyed being in the outdoors and had developed a fondness for nature. He had a growing concern about the deteriorating environment in the United States and especially after witnessing the effects of a massive oil spill in California. He announced the idea for a teach-in on college campuses to the media and persuaded conservation-minded Republican congressman Pete McCloskey to serve as co-chair. They recruited a young activist, Denis Hayes to organize the campus teach-ins and chose April 22, a date between Spring Break and Final Exams. They developed a staff to promote all the events and included a wide range of organizations and faith groups. They called it Earth Day and with a great deal of media attention inspired 20 million Americans to demonstrate publicly against many forms of pollution. It became a coalition of activist groups fighting against pollution through education, research, demonstration and lobbying for increased anti-pollution legislation. In the 1990's, Earth Day became a global effort and through the years, as public awareness catches up to science new goals have arisen. Currently the need to address climate change, its effects, and humankind's part in it has become quite urgent.



Let's celebrate Earth Day in Pearland with the following events.

Earth Day from 10 AM to 2 PM at Centennial Park on Harkey Rd. is the city-wide family celebration of Earth Day with games, vendors, and a general good time. It's also **Drug** Take Back Day at the Stella Roberts Recycling Center at the same time. So, you can clean out your medicine cabinet and drop off unused meds at the SRRC on your way to the Earth Day Celebration. See you there.
