

Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

One of the things that has historically taken place during the season of Lent is a focus on discipleship. In fact, for the earliest Christians, Lent was the season of final preparations for baptism. Baptism was the entryway and gate for full participation in the church. In some settings, unbaptized participants in worship were dismissed before communion which was only received by the baptized. Those who were unbaptized were dismissed in order to receive further instruction and training in the ways of discipleship. That whole process is what is known as catechesis.

On Wednesday evenings during Lent we will gather for midweek worship and Bible study. During that time, we'll be picking up this old pattern of instructing and training in the ways of discipleship. Our time will be spent studying a familiar passage, John 4:1-42. It's the story of the Samaritan woman that Jesus encounters at the well. This is a fascinating story that only occurs in the gospel



according to John. Each week I will teach on a different piece of the story as we progress our way through the whole passage. You're invited to come and learn what this story has to teach us about discipleship.

Discipleship is a fancy church word that always needs defining. It means to follow in the way of Jesus. Jesus said, "I am the way and the truth and the life" (John 14:6). The earliest followers of Jesus were given a label. It wasn't "church" or "Christian" or even "disciple." They were called those "who belonged to the Way" (Acts 9:2). That tells us a couple of very interesting things. One, the experience of encountering Jesus was characterized by following a path known as the Way, not just thinking, confessing, or believing anything. Two, the participants in the Way were identified by how they belonged to it.

Belonging is the title for our Lenten sermon series on Sundays. It is a word that is worth pondering. How do you belong to something? Is it about signing up, filling out paperwork,

attending meetings or services, or volunteering? At what point do you know that you belong? How do you belong to a church? How do you belong to God?

You could make an argument that when some of those earliest Christian communities dismissed the unbaptized from worship before communion it was harsh and unwelcoming. You might wonder how such a policy ever allowed a group like that to grow or flourish at all. My hunch is that there is something else going on in that restrictive environment. And it has to do with belonging.

I think the earliest Christians wanted to make sure that every new convert fully belonged and understood what that meant. They wanted them to know what it means to fully belong to God through baptism in Jesus' death and resurrection by the power of the Spirit. They wanted them to know what it means to fully belong to one another as a group who shared a communal life. Belonging didn't mean dropping in on Sunday morning when it was convenient. Belonging means a deep, abiding way of doing life together and holding each other in prayer through joys and sorrows.

Here is the point. When you hear the gospel, you are experiencing the words and actions of Jesus. When you experience Jesus, you are meeting the living God. And when you meet the living God you should not expect to walk away the same person as before. Every encounter you have with Jesus through the gospel is potentially a life-altering reorientation of your soul. If you will open your heart and receive him with a willing spirit. Who knows what might happen?

God welcomes and invites you to belong to God. You experience belonging to God through the word and sacraments (water, bread, and wine). Belonging to God is also belonging to the community of God's people. You are baptized into a body. You are fed and nourished at the table with all God's saints. You belong to God.

Mission Trip Update Korie Williams

As most of you know I have put a lot of effort into planning a mission trip that would benefit the high school class. Originally, I set out to plan a trip that would not only involve fun moments of play, but also moments of work to which we would return with memories knowing we helped people who needed it. As time went on, I did not get the response from the high schoolers, which I hoped, leading to a slight change of plans.

About a month ago I sat down with Pastor to have a conversation about a few things, and the mission trip was brought up. He informed me he would not be able to join us on this trip. I then asked him if he minded if I took the entire thing over, and he agreed and gave me resources to churches in New Orleans. I also explained that I had noticed a lack of excitement within the high school class, and I felt like I was planning a trip for just me. We talked about that, and I explained an idea I had, and we both agreed it was the best I could do.

This is to inform everyone that this trip will no longer be for the High school class. I have reached out to the people who spent time, money, and resources to support me with the fundraisers I put together and asked if they would like to join me instead. As of now I have 10 people who are interested and 10 is the max I can take with me.

I have reached out to an organization in New Orleans and have talked over the phone with one of the ladies who helps run it. I registered us, New Life Lutheran, with their organization for June 10. This organization builds homes for low-income families who are first-time homeowners and rebuilds homes for families who have experienced natural disasters free of charge. They rely on the help of volunteers and have expressed their gratitude that a group of us is willing to help in any way we can. I hope by going and helping rebuild somewhere else we can see the beauty in coming together to rebuild and make someone's house a home. I have other things lined-up and other organizations that I have reached out to.

I wanted to give transparency in the change of who is going. You gave your money with a good heart, understanding that the money you were donating was being used to send high schoolers on this trip. While I will be there representing a part of the youth/high schoolers here at this church I want everyone to know I will not be wasting this money or opportunity you have given me.



If the people who are lined up to go cannot make it and must cancel, and you would like to go, please talk to me about going, I can put your name down in the event someone cancels. If there are any questions on your mind pertaining to the trip, please talk to me so we are all on the same page. If there is any concern or you want to know how you can help in any way again, find me, talk to me. Thank you.

Thanks to Diane Tanksley, Cheryl Robinson, Ryan Strickland, and Helen Beckman for picking up litter along Orange Street on February 4. In 2 ½ hours they picked up three bags of trash, a half bag of recycling, and 216 cigarette butts. Ryan earned volunteer credit toward his boy scout conservation badge. Our **next cleanup** is the "**Don't Mess with Texas Cleanup" on the first of April**. It's the annual highway cleanup of Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT), who coined the phrase "Don't mess with Texas" for its anti-litter campaign. TXDOT is the registered owner of the phrase and its intended purpose is to keep the roadsides clean. In addition to its anti-litter program, TXDOT also plants wildflowers along the highways. Keep Pearland Beautiful always schedules a clean-up to coincide with Don't Mess with Texas. Plan now to participate with our clean-up on April 1.

Thanks to the Arbor Day tree give-away, we have two red mulberry trees ready to be planted. I'd appreciate suggestions of location and help digging the hole. We will not be planting them close to the sidewalk or parking lots where berries could stain the sidewalk or cars.

I was asked about the clear cutting of trees to make way for the school at the corner of Liberty Drive and Broadway. When trees are cut down to make way for development, the developer is required by city ordinance to replace the trees on site or at another location or pay into the city's tree fund. Pearland is registered with Arbor Day Foundation as a tree city and had to meet and continue to meet certain requirements such as having an urban forester on staff, having a tree ordinance, provisions for planting trees with new development and preserving, increasing, and keeping inventory of the city's current tree canopy.

Thursday, March 9 is Garden Lecture at 7 P.M. on KPB's Facebook. The topic, Wild About Wildflowers, will be presented by master gardener Kimberly Mayer.

Saturday, March 11 from 7:30 to 10:00 A.M.is Keep Pearland Beautiful Waterway Cleanup in Centennial Park. Meet at Lone Star Pavilion for breakfast and supplies.

Saturday, April 1 is Don't Mess with Texas Litter Cleanup at 8:30 A.M. Meet at the church to participate in our adopt-a-spot cleanup. Snacks and supplies will be provided. Youth participants can get volunteer credit for school or scouts.
