#### Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

May 1 is a very special, memorable day for me. It's the day that you, the people of New Life Lutheran Church in Pearland, called me to be your pastor. May 1 marks one year of time since we began our journey together as pastor and people of God.

I can't help but go back to the first things I said to you after that vote. They are words that I thought about well in advance of that congregational meeting. They are words that I will possibly revisit every year, as a reminder about how I felt when everything started. Here is what I said.

"I am making you three promises. One, I will love you as a pastor. I will do my best to be there for you when you need a pastor. I will offer you my listening ear whenever you need it. I will pray with you and remind you that God loves you when you are facing the unknown.

The second promise is that I will tell you the truth.
Sometimes you'll ask me my opinion about something, or you'll come to me seeking advice. When you do, I will tell you the truth, putting it as

gently as I can. I will speak the truth to you even when it is difficult to hear.

The third promise is that I am going to mess up. It is important for you to hear this from the beginning of my ministry with you: I am not going to be perfect. Don't put me on a pedestal as your pastor. I am human like every one of you. I am going to make mistakes.

I may make choices that you don't like. Sometimes these choices will be mistakes on my part, which was my third promise to you. Other times choices you consider to be unfavorable will be an attempt to bring new life to New Life. Gardeners know about the pruning process. I can't imagine that the plant enjoys being pruned, but it is sometimes necessary to create the conditions where new life and growth can occur. Be patient and trust God."

I still whole-heartedly believe in all of that. I also believe that I have kept all three of those promises. This first year has had its challenges and conflicts. Some of those were unavoidable and needed to occur. Some of the challenges faced were the remnants of previous years of ministry, the pandemic, and a long stretch of interim time.

Where New Life sits today is totally different than it was one year ago. And with the Spirit's guidance, a year from now we will be totally different than we are today. That is what following Jesus does. It provokes us to examine the things in our life that need pruning and take calculated risks in order to grow into something more fruitful.

What are you willing to do to be a more fruitful church for God? What does it look like for New Life to be faithful in the ministry Jesus has entrusted to us? Where is the Spirit beckoning us to step out and trust without having all the clarity we might hope for?



These are all questions we wrestle with and discuss together. As I write, we are approaching the Church Huddle on April 29. I expect that to be a very exciting, hopeful meeting. We will spend time listening to God's word and to each other. We will consider the disappointments and hopefilled days of New Life's history. We will think about a vision for the future ministry of New Life, a mission that God is calling us to, and the core values that will guide our choices. We will think about strategies to move us forward.

These are all things that can't be accomplished by any single one of us. It takes the whole church, each part, from the least to the greatest. Everyone has a part to play and gift to offer. Days of joy and blessings are ahead.





#### Mission Trip to New Orleans Korie Williams

In June, I will be joined by other members of the church which include Bryan Bradford, Elna Ritter, Mary-Ann Marcha, Louis Marcha, and Jackie Torres on our church mission trip.

I wanted to bring something to New Life that had a lesson attached. So, I set out on a rigorous mission to research and find an organization where we could help. I eventually found SBP. SBP is an amazing non-profit organization which was founded in 2006 after Hurricane Katrina devastated New Orleans. After the founders, Liz McCartney and Zach Rosenburg realized Katrina had done more damage than they had imagined they moved permanently to New Orleans and started SBP. Now they have different locations throughout the U.S. In 2017, they added one right here in Houston to help with the damage we all experienced after Hurricane Harvey. They are still here and help coordinate projects within Houston and surrounding cities.

Because SBP is a non-profit organization they do not charge the people they help. They rely on the help of volunteers. I reached out to them in early January and was connected to a wonderful lady named Lalibela Walto. Lalibela and I have talked over the phone and through numerous emails and every time she expresses her gratitude that we are willing to come to New Orleans and help them out. Lalibela also told me about how they don't just help families affected by natural disasters, but also low-income families who don't have the money to go through realtors but are in desperate need of housing. During one of our conversations, she asked "would you rather help low-income families or ones affected by natural disaster?". I told her it didn't matter we were there to serve anyone who needed a little help. No matter what we do we will do it with a smile.

Outside of our participation with SBP, we will be doing the usual New Orleans activities like swamp tours and of course the cemetery tours! Don't worry, we will definitely be trying our fair share of their beignets and New Orleans cuisine.

There is a lot of time, effort, love, and patience that has been put into this trip and I hope it can lead as an example of what is possible for us here at New Life. When we leave New Orleans, I hope we can leave with a glad heart and an appreciation of the rich New Orleans history.



**Recycle update**. Plastic film is now accepted at Stella Roberts Recycling Center (SRRC) for recycling. This includes all plastic bags, wraps, cereal box liners, newspaper sleeves, dry cleaner bags, bubble wrap, and plastic e-commerce mailers. They must be dry and free of food and organic residue.

Aluminum recycling doesn't have to be clean, including anything made of aluminum, cans, pans, plates, and foil. Aluminum is the easiest and least expensive to return to the form where it can be reprocessed into new products. An aluminum can may be back on the grocery shelf within 45 days. So, go ahead and recycle those greasy pans from your barbecue. Just don't let them contaminate other kinds of recycling that need to remain clean, such as paper and cardboard. We collect aluminum separately at church for the youth fund.

**Pizza boxes** can be recycled with the cardboard if you cut out food contaminated parts. I usually just rip off the covers if they are clean.

Thanks to Teri Kiser for helping me pick up litter on Orange Street. We completed the most time-consuming part, but I still have to finish to Schleider Drive. I will give a complete report next month. Dianne Tanksley who usually helps was unable to because of a recent minor surgery. She came anyway to cheer us on, make coffee, and check out ant hills for Amdro treatment.

April, Earth Month, was an amazing time for me. There was so much information available on radio, TV, newspapers, magazines, internet, and KPB, culminating in Earth Day at Centennial Park. I hope that those of you who did get to the celebration learned something and had a good time. The weather was perfect. I still have information to share but I'll continue next month.
