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
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Walk in Newness of Life Pastor Clayton Faulkner

The time has come for New Life to do some intentional long-range planning. Church strategic planning is a process that involves setting long-term goals, determining the necessary steps to achieve those goals, and implementing a plan to guide our church's growth and development.

We have recently come through a season of discerning what our church's mission is: to raise disciples planted in God's love, growing in faithfulness, and nurturing the world. We have also determined the vision of who God is calling us to be as a church:

The vision of New Life Lutheran Church is to be a vibrant spiritual community where people of all ages and stages of life can thrive through the abundance found in Jesus. We want to be a church that is small enough that we can be known to one another and big enough to imagine God's love for all the earth. We desire to be rooted in God's word and call all people to engage in the sacraments of water and table. We feel called to help everyone, especially young people, discover the Lutheran witness in our day and time through serving our neighbors nearby and around the world.

A strategic plan is how we put legs on all these words. It is a list of goals and actions that move us forward into being who God is calling us to be. It will take time to work this process (similar to the time it took to arrive at our guiding statement). It will take a team effort. It will take input and follow-through from everyone. It will bring about the next phase of our ministry in Pearland.

Is this something we're required to do? No. We are able to function pretty smoothly right now. We have what we need, more or less, to get by week to week, month to month, year to year. The church can certainly survive with how we currently do things. Our vision, however, is to become a "vibrant spiritual community." The mission and vision of our church will take intentional planning and work to become reality. I boldly believe that God has placed New Life in this corner of Pearland for a grand purpose. God has us here for a reason ("to raise disciples...") and this is a chance to dream of how God wants to use our church for the sake of Jesus and the gospel.

According to one consultant, there are twelve keys or characteristics of thriving churches:

Relational Characteristics – the sources of satisfaction in congregations:

- Specific, concrete missional objectives
- Pastoral and lay visitation
- Corporate, dynamic worship
- Significant relational groups
- Strong leadership resources
- Streamlined structure and solid, participatory decision making

Functional Characteristics – if these are not in place, are the source of dissatisfaction in churches:

- Several competent programs and activities
- Open accessibility
- High visibility
- Adequate parking, land, and landscaping
- Adequate space and facilities
- Solid financial resources

Is there risk involved with strategic planning? Yes. We can't predict the future or when the next pandemic or another similar life-altering event will occur. That's why a window of no more than three years will be considered for the plan. Because even in that time frame, a lot can change.

A reminder from God's word about our planning: "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope" (Jeremiah 29:11). God has a future with hope for New Life! Do you believe this? We can be a beacon of God's salvation that comes through grace to our neighborhood. God has plans for us.

Have you pondered what plans God has for New Life Lutheran Church? In God's mind, what does our future look like? If we dream with God's inspiration, by the power of the Spirit, can we also glimpse what might be possible?

I hope you'll come to the next Church Huddle on Saturday, April 20 at 10:00 AM. If you're invested in the future of New Life you won't want to miss it! We will begin to think about this strategic planning process and where it might take us.



Notes from Rebecca Rebecca McDonald, Director of Worship and Music

The phrase "lend a helping hand" has been around for centuries, and variations of the phrase are found in many cultures. When you lend a helping hand, you are giving aid, assistance, or support. You are not doing the entire job yourself, but are working together with someone else to complete the task. The word "lend" implies something that you give temporarily, and use of the word "hand" suggests some physical action on your part.

Here at New Life, all of the volunteers who help in worship each week are part of our Helping Hands ministry. These volunteers are a vital part of our worship services, and we are always looking for more helpers. As the saying goes, many hands make light work. The more folks we have for a particular role, the less often everyone has to rotate in. Currently, we have six teams consisting of assisting ministers, communion assistants, ushers, greeters, acolytes, and technology operators. Volunteers receive a digital sign-up sheet each month, or you can physically sign up using the white Helping Hands notebook in the narthex. If you are interested in a role but are feeling unsure about it, please let me know. Training is always provided, and I am happy to help you and answer any questions you may have.

Whatever your gifts, we have a place for you on a Helping Hands team. If you don't mind reading aloud, consider being an assisting minister. If you prefer helping with logistics, you may enjoy being an usher or communion assistant. If you naturally enjoy saying hello to people, you are a perfect candidate to be a greeter, and anyone who is tall enough to operate the candle lighters can be an acolyte. We do need some tech savvy folks in the audio/visual department (high schoolers, I'm looking at you!), but we can also use anyone who meets the following requirements: (1) you have fingers and (2) you can stay awake during the entire worship service. We can really use some more folks to run the PowerPoint slides during worship; you just have to follow along and click the remote at the appropriate times.

For everyone who is already on a Helping Hands team, thank you! For everyone else, I invite you to prayerfully consider whether you might be called to join one of our teams. And as you consider it, I thought a list of the top ten reasons to volunteer might be, well, HELPful.

A-la David Letterman, cue the drum roll. Here are the

TOP TEN REASONS TO VOLUNTEER IN OUR HELPING HANDS MINISTRY:

Number 10: Never underestimate the power of volunteers. Remember, Noah's ark was built by volunteers, but the Titanic was built by professionals.

Number 9: Volunteering makes you healthier. Ok, maybe I can't promise that you'll lose 20 pounds in one week, but there are indeed studies which show that volunteers enjoy better health and wellness. According to the Mayo Clinic, "Volunteers report better physical health than nonvolunteers. Research also has shown that volunteering leads to lower rates of depression and anxiety."

Number 8: Going small is okay. Even a seemingly small act, like greeting people as they enter, lighting candles, or clicking the worship slides, is a huge part of creating a meaningful worship experience for members and guests alike. As an African proverb says, "If you think you are too small to make a difference, try sleeping with a mosquito."

Number 7: You get better snacks. Have you ever been hurrying to church and run by the fellowship hall, only to discover there's no coffee left, or your favorite chocolate donuts are all gone? Well, since worship helpers often arrive at church a little bit earlier to prepare for their roles, they have first dibs on the coffee and goodies. It's true.

Number 6: Volunteering lowers your stress levels. Again, the Mayo Clinic reports, "Volunteering reduces stress and increases positive, relaxed feelings by releasing dopamine." Who couldn't use a little less stress in their lives?

Number 5: It looks great on your résumé. No, seriously, it does. If you're a young person with college applications and job interviews ahead, or if you're dusting off your résumé to get back on the market, regular volunteer work demonstrates your commitment, dedication, and willingness to serve. And even if you're past those stages of your life, volunteering is a great way to learn a new skill and to provide a sense of purpose.

Number 4: You will improve Rebecca's quality of sleep. When I know all of our Helping Hands roles are covered for the upcoming week, I sleep much better at night. Now that's a pretty compelling reason, right?!

Number 3: Volunteering makes you happier. According to projecthelping.org, 94% of people who volunteer say that volunteering improves their mood. When you join a Helping Hands team, you may feel a sense of purpose and accomplishment as you help to enhance our worship. You may meet new friends and learn new skills. And in turn, you just might feel happier!

Number 2: You are living out our core values. At New Life, we celebrate our core values of worship, family, hospitality, community, and service. When you assist with worship as part of a Helping Hands team, you are becoming these core values in action.

And the number one reason to volunteer in our Helping Hands ministry: God calls you to it. As disciples of Jesus, we are called to follow his example of servanthood by helping and serving others. Scripture is chock full of exhortations about serving. The first book of Peter, chapter 4, verse 10 says: "10 Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received." In the epistle to the Colossians it says, "23 Whatever your

task, put yourselves into it, as done for the Lord and not for your masters, ²⁴since you know that from the Lord you will receive the inheritance as your reward; you serve the Lord Christ." (Col. 3:23-24) And the book of Hebrews reminds us: "¹Let mutual love continue. ²Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." (Heb. 13:1-2)

There is always a place for you in our Helping Hands ministries. Come, join us!

Thursday, April 11, is Garden Live on Facebook from 7 to 8 PM. The topic is Entomology: Pests and Beneficials. The presenter is from Brazoria County Master Gardeners. When you know your insects, you can avoid the use of chemical insecticides.

Saturday April 13 is the monthly paper shredding event at the Stella Roberts Recycling Center (SRRC) from 9 to 1. Paper only, no staples or windows in envelopes are accepted.

Thursday, April 18 is KPB Gala & Trashion Show Fundraiser at Knights of Columbus Hall from 6 to 9 PM. Models will wear clothing made from a variety of materials saved from the trash bin. Proceeds support the operation of the SRRC and other environmental programs of KPB.

Monday, April 22 is Earth Day, celebrated by people all over our planet. It's amazing to me how much we are learning about our geological history these days by looking into the actual past. Because of the time it takes light to travel through distance in a year (measured as light-years), the further we look into space, the further into history we see. According to an article in Space Newsletter, astronomers viewing space through the Webb telescope are now seeing a galaxy formed 33.6 billion light years ago, when our universe was just 400 million years old.

Nova on PBS had a wonderful program about researching the history of the earth's atmosphere through ice cores taken deep from arctic glaciers. Air bubbles trapped in ice sheets as it formed over the years, going back 800,000 years are analyzed to determine the percentage of carbon dioxide (CO2) in the atmosphere each year. Likewise, mud cores taken from the ocean floor contain ancient clam shells that, when analyzed, reveal the history of ocean heat. When heat data and CO2 data are graphed and



superimposed, there is an amazing correlation between the two. Over the past 800,000 years there is a range of highs and lows that within the past 150 years rises steadily above that range and continues to rise more dramatically over the past 50 years. Currently we have a greater concentration of CO2 in our atmosphere than any time over the past 800,000 years. That's one of the reasons that scientists are calling our present time the Anthropocene age, meaning the period when Humanity is the dominant influence on climate and the environment. History informs us of the past to help us plan for the future. One possibility is to continue on our current tract and become like our sister planet, Venus, similar in size and makeup. The perfect example of runaway greenhouse gas atmosphere. Its atmosphere is mostly CO2. All the heat waves that go in remain trapped. It is the hottest planet in our solar system, hot enough to melt lead.

Or we could do whatever is possible for us to do to change the trajectory of CO2 in our atmosphere downward. We are planting trees with the help of our urban forester and the Pearland tree fund. Please enjoy our new trees as they grow around our church.

A Little Background on Pearland's Meals on Wheels Barbara Flowers

For almost 30 years, community volunteers have been delivering fully prepared meals to senior citizens and the homebound in the Pearland area. It has allowed many individuals to remain independent in their own homes rather than having to move to a care facility. The nutritious meals served to Meals on Wheels clients are carefully prepared by trained staff in the kitchen of Memorial Hermann Hospital - Pearland.

Hot meals are delivered Monday through Friday by a driver who also checks on the well-being of each client - bringing peace of mind to the clients and their families.

Equally important are the smiles and companionship that accompany each meal delivery. For many homebound clients, the **Meals on Wheels** driver is the only person they see during the day.

Pearland Meals on Wheels, Inc. is a not for profit corporation run by a board of directors. It is a volunteer-based organization primarily run through leadership from eight local churches. Our organization is funded through donations from these churches, as well as local civic groups and businesses and other generous donors. There is no financial support from the United Way or from state or federal funds; all support comes through the love and caring of local Pearland residents.

Our next delivery date will be April 29-May 3.
